WHAT'S YOUR CLAN?

Piping student Jim Roberts tells "The Clay Piper" his Celtic clan is of Welsh descent and provides us with this information on the "PROBERT" Clan.

Probert is a Germanic name adopted by the Welsh (Robat) during early medieval times after the Norman conquest. Derived from hrod 'fame' and berht 'bright'. Name would appear to




have its origins in describing a "well known' and sensible person". Thought to be the 6th most pop-

ular surname in Wales.

The surname Probert was first found in Pant Glas near the village of Trelleck, county of Monmouthshire (Welsh: Sir Fynwy), where Thomas ap Robert (d. 1536), son of Robert ap Jenkins (d. 1509), gentleman usher of King Henry VII was found. Thomas' son Walter was the first to bear the Probert surname. Another early reference finds the family name at Chirk, on the Welsh border.

Prominent amongst the family during the late Middle Ages was Sir George Probert (c.1617-1677), Welsh politician from Pant Glas, Raglan, Monmouth-

shire, Member of the Parliament of England for Monmouth Boroughs from 1661 to 1677. His son, Henry Probert (1645-1719?) was a Welsh


SCOTTISH FOLKLORE

Do you know *Brahan Seer*, well-known as Kenneth Mackenzie, or Coinneach Odhar (Kenneth the Sallow)? Known colloquially as the "*Brahan Seer*," he is believed to have been born on the island of Skye in the 17th century. Little is known about the early life of the Kenneth Mackenzie. The story says that the day after his mother's graveyard encounter, he found an adder stone (a glassy stone with a hole in the center) that he was able to see visions of the future through. He later worked on the grounds of Brahan Castle for the 3rd Earl of Seaforth, after being invited when his prowess for seeing the future came

to light. It was a job that would ultimately lead to his downfall. He predicted for Lady Seaforth that her husband was engaging in amorous activities while he was in France. Horrified by the scandal and shame that this would bring upon her house and marriage, she ordered Mackenzie's death. He was reportedly burned alive in a tar barrel at Chanonry Point, near Inverness. In the years following his death, a number of the prophecies that Mackenzie made came to

fruition. Upon visiting Drumossie Moor, the site of the Battle of Culloden, he is recorded as saying:

"Oh! Drumossie, thy bleak moor shall, ere many generations have passed away, be stained with the best blood of the Highlands. Glad am I that I will not see the day, for it will be a fearful period; heads will be lopped off by the score, and no mercy shall be shown or quarter given on either side."

He also predicted the discovery of North Sea oil, with the ominous sounding words "A black rain will bring riches to Aberdeen."

He claimed that when men could walk between England and France, Scotland would see its old parliament. The Channel Tunnel was opened in 1994, making this a reality, and the Scottish Parliament was formally reconvened in 1999.

A particular Celtic stone known as the Eagle stone stands in the town of Strathpeffer in Ross-shire. The prophecy goes that if the stone falls down three times, Loch Ussie would flood the valley below the town. The stone has fallen down twice in its lifetime - it has now been set in concrete to prevent that particular prophecy from coming true!

Despite being shrouded in mystery and mythology, the words of the Brahan Seer still ring true today.

PIPER NEEDED!

Every weekday since she came to the throne in 1952, Queen Elizabeth has started her day to the sound of a lone piper playing beneath her bedroom window. This tradition dates

back 175 years to her great-great grandmother, Queen Victoria. The Royal Household can practically set their watches by the pipes, which starts precisely at 9am and last for exactly 15 minutes.

The Piper to the Sovereign, Pipe Major Scot Methven, 5 Scots Argyll and Sutherland Highlander, became only the 15th piper to hold the post when he was appointed in 2015. Unfortunately, he sadly had to relinquish his duties unexpectedly for family reasons. For the first time since 1843 (aside from four years during the Second World War), the monarch has no official bagpiper.

The position of Piper to the Sovereign was established after Queen Victoria discovered that

the Marquess of Breadalbane had his own personal piper. Traditionally the post is held by a serving noncommissioned officer and Pipe Major from a Scottish or Irish Regiment.

Of the 15 pipers, 11 have been in the present Queen's reign, including Alexander MacDonald, who served from 1945 to 1966, and his successor Andrew Pitkeathly, who served until 1973.

The piper's principal duty is to play under the Queen's window when she is at Buckingham Palace, Windsor Castle, Holyrood Palace or Balmoral, but he also co-ordinates Army pipers who play after state banquets and escorts the Queen to the audiences she has throughout the day.

Pipers are personally interviewed by the monarch to see if their personalities will match, as the two interact so regularly. It is said her piper travels with her even more than her husband.

Most remain tight-lipped about their posts but Gordon Webster, who held the title in the 1990s, once said: 'Because the Queen doesn't like you repeating the same tunes everyday, so I had about 700 tunes stored in my head.

Max Stewart, who has also piped for the Queen said, "At Balmoral you must try not to repeat a tune the whole trip, which is quite an achievement."
